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Important Safety Precautions

Warning

Violation of the instructions may cause serious injury or death.



- Never use an unapproved battery since this could damage the phone and/or battery and could cause the battery to explode.



- Never place your phone in a microwave oven as it will cause the battery to explode.
- Never store your phone in temperatures less than -4°F or greater than 122°F .
- Do not dispose of your battery near fire or with hazardous or flammable materials.



- When riding in a car, do not leave your phone or set up the hands-free kit near the air bag. If wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag is deployed, you may be seriously injured.



- Do not use a hand-held phone while driving.
- Do not use the phone in areas where its use is prohibited. (For example: aircraft)

- Do not expose the battery charger or adapter to direct sunlight or use it in places with high humidity, such as a bathroom.

This user's guide provides important information on the use and operation of your phone. Please read this guide carefully prior to using the phone to be able to use your phone to its greatest advantage and to prevent any accidental damage or misuse. Any unapproved changes or modifications will void your warranty.

Technical Details

The Versa™ is an all digital phone that operates on both Code Division Multiple Access (CDMA) frequencies: cellular services at 800 MHz and Personal Communication Services (PCS) at 1.9 GHz. CDMA technology uses a feature called DSSS (Direct Sequence Spread Spectrum) that enables the phone to keep communication from being crossed and to use one frequency channel by multiple users in the same specific area. This results in a 10-fold capacity increase when compared with analog mode. In addition, features such as soft/ softer handoff, hard handoff, and dynamic RF power control technologies combine to reduce call interruptions.

The Cellular and PCS CDMA networks consist of MSO (Mobile Switching Office), BSC (Base

Station Controller), BTS (Base Station Transmission System), and MS (Mobile Station).

1xRTT system receives twice as many subscribers in the wireless section as IS-95. Its battery life is twice as long as IS-95. High-speed data transmission is also possible. EV-DO system is optimized for data service and is much faster than 1xRTT system in applicable area. The table on the following page lists some major CDMA standards.

18. Camera Lens



NOTE

Press the Unlock Key, or any other side key, to illuminate the Touch Screen. Press the Unlock Key(again), or touch the padlock icon, to unlock the Touch Screen.

- 1. 2.5mm Headset jack** Allows you to plug in an optional headset for convenient, hands-free conversations.
- 2. Camera Key** Use for quick access to Camera function. Press once to activate the Camera. Press and hold the Camera Key to record Video.
- 3. Side Volume Keys** Use to adjust the Master Volume in standby mode* and the Earpiece Volume during a call. In camera mode, activates zoom in & out.
- 4. Cover Lock Latch** Use to detach Qwerty keypad from the phone.
- 5. Accessory Charger Port** Connects the phone to the battery charger, USB cable, or other compatible accessory.
- 6. Touch Soft Keys** Touch Keys on this Touchpad include Messaging, Call, Menu and Contacts which easily activate with the touch of your fingertip.
- 7. Microphone** Allows other callers to hear you clearly when you are speaking to them.
- 8. SEND Key** Use to make calls.
- 9. Clear/Voice Command/Voice Recorder Key** Delete single characters (quick press) or entire words (press and hold) while entering text. Back out of menus, one level at a time. From standby mode, activate Voice Commands (quick press) or Voice Recorder (press and hold).
- 10. Power/END Key** Use to turn the power on/off and to end a call. Also returns to standby mode.
- 11. Shortcut Menu Touch Key** Allows access to customize cubic menus (Favorites/Shortcuts/Media).
- 12. Touch Screen** Displays incoming calls, messages and indicator icons as well as a wide variety of content you select to view.
- 13. microSD™ Slot** Accommodates optional microSD card.
- 14. Proximity Sensor** When close (within 2-3 cm) to this sensor during a call, LCD turns off allowing you to only adjust volume or end the call so that you don't inadvertently activate a feature. When blocked with phone case or etc., LCD backlight turns off also.
- 15. Earpiece** Lets you hear the caller.
- 16. Unlock/Lock Key** Press to unlock or lock the Touch Screen and keys in standby mode.
- 17. Light Sensor** Detects the amount of light, adjusts brightness of the LCD. It conserves power and extends LCD screen life.
- 18. Camera Lens** Keep it clean for optimal photo quality.

* Standby mode is when the phone is waiting for input from you. No menu is displayed and the phone isn't performing any action. It's the starting point for all of the instruction steps.



The Battery

NOTE It is important to fully charge the battery before initial use of the phone.

The phone comes with a rechargeable battery. Keep the battery charged while not in use in order to maximize talk and standby time. The battery charge level is shown at the top of the LCD screen.

Installing the Battery

1. Insert the bottom of the battery into the opening on the back of the phone.
2. Push the battery down until it clicks into place.



Removing the Battery

1. Turn power off. Slide the cover lock latch down in the direction of the arrow.
2. Carefully separate the device from the Qwerty Keypad.



3. Place a fingertip in the cutout to lift the edge of the battery, then remove it.



Turning the Phone On and Off

Install a charged battery or connect the phone to an external power source.

1. Press the Power/End Key  for a few seconds until the Touch Screen lights up.

Turning the Phone Off

1. Touch  or press the Unlock Key () at the top edge of the device twice.
2. Press the Power/End Key  for a few seconds until the display turns off.


Charging the Battery

Your Versa™ device comes with a cableless travel adapter and a USB data cable which connect together to charge your phone. To charge your phone:

NOTICE

Please use only an approved charging accessory to charge your LG phone. Improper handling of the charging port, as well as the use of an incompatible charger, may cause damage to your phone and void the warranty.

1. Connect the cableless travel adapter and USB data cable. When connecting as shown below, the LG logo on the USB cable should face toward you.



2. Gently uncover the accessory charging port, then plug the end of the AC adapter into the phone's charger port and the other end into an electrical outlet.



NOTICE

LG logo should face up.

3. The charge time varies depending upon the battery level.

Charging with USB

You can use your computer to charge your phone. To be able to charge with the USB cable, you need to have the necessary USB drivers installed on your PC first. Connect one end of the USB cable to the charging accessory port on your phone and the other end to a highpower USB port on your PC.

How to Install Your microSD™ Card



NOTE If the Qwerty Keypad is attached to your device, first slide the cover lock latch down and separate the device from the Qwerty Keypad to locate and access the microSD slot.

1. Locate the microSD™ slot on the right side of the phone and gently uncover the slot opening (microSD™ slot cover stays attached to the phone so you don't lose it).
2. Insert the microSD™ card in the correct direction until it clicks into the slot. If you insert the card in the wrong direction, it may damage your phone or your card.

How to Remove Your microSD™ Card

1. Gently press and release the exposed edge of the microSD™ card to eject it.
2. Remove the microSD™ card from the slot and replace the cover.

NOTE Do not attempt to remove the microSD™ card while reading or writing to the card.

NOTE Users wishing to transfer music onto a MicroSD™ card inserted into this phone (either through MTP Sync or Over the Air) must first format the MicroSD™ card on this handset. Warning: Formatting the MicroSD™ card will erase all contents on the card. In the event the MicroSD™ card is used on this phone without first formatting it, the phone will display a "MOD license acquisition error". Song files downloaded or otherwise purchased from third party providers and stored on a MicroSD™ card inserted into this device may be protected or encrypted by such provider and cannot be played on this device.

Battery Temperature Protection

If the battery gets overheated, the phone will automatically turn off. When you turn the phone back on, a message pops up alerting you that the phone was powered off for your safety.

Battery Charge Level

You can find the battery charge level at the top right of the LCD screen. When the charge level becomes low, the battery sensor sounds a warning tone, blinks the battery icon, and displays a warning message. As the charge level approaches empty, the phone automatically switches off without saving.

Signal Strength

Call quality depends on the signal strength in your area. You can tell how much signal strength you have by the number of bars next to the signal strength icon: the more bars, the stronger the signal. If you're having problems with signal quality, move to an open area or, when inside a building, try moving near a window.

Screen Icons

When the phone is on, the top line of the LCD screen displays phone status icons.

1. Touch  or press the Unlock Key () at the top edge of the device twice.
2. Touch Menu  to access the menu.
3. Touch the Settings & Tools icon .
4. Scroll the screen up and touch **Phone Info**.
5. Touch **Icon Glossary**.

Making Calls

1. Touch  or press the Unlock Key () at the top edge of the device twice.
2. Touch the Touch Soft Key that looks like a phone  to display a numeric keypad, then enter the phone number you want to call.

NOTE You can also make a call to numbers in your phone's memory. Touch **RECENT** to make a call to a Recent call entry, or touch **CONTACTS** to call a number you saved in your Contact List.

3. Press the Send Key  or touch .



Correcting Dialing Mistakes

If you make a mistake while dialing a number, press the Clear/Voice Commands Key  once to erase the last digit entered, or hold down the Clear/Voice Commands Key  for at least two seconds to delete all digits.

NOTE To activate the speakerphone during a call, simply touch .

Redialing Calls

Press and hold either Send Key  to redial the last number you dialed, received or missed in call history. The last 270 numbers are stored in the call history list and you can also select one of these to redial.

NOTE To redial the last call from the recent call list, touch  to the right of the top entry in your call list.

Receiving Calls

1. When the phone rings or vibrates, simply press the Qwerty Send Key  on the outside of the Qwerty Keypad. Or, open the Qwerty flip and touch the **Answer** Touch Key.
2. Press either Power/End Key  to end the call.

NOTE When using the device without the Qwerty Keypad and the Touch Screen is locked, touch the Unlock Touch Key  or press the Unlock Key  at the top edge of the phone then you can touch the **Answer** Touch Key to answer the call.

NOTE If you touch **Quiet** while the phone is ringing and unlocked, the ringing or vibration is muted for that call. If you touch **Ignore** while the phone is ringing and unlocked, the call will end or go to voicemail.

Quick Glance of Touch Screen and How to Use It

Touch Sensitive Soft Keys



1. Make sure your hands are clean and dry. Remove moisture from the surface of your hands. Don't use the touch keys in a humid environment.
2. Touch key sensors are sensitive to your light touch. You don't need to press them forcefully to use them. Protect your phone from severe impact because touch key sensors may become damaged from harsh use.
3. Use the tip of your finger to touch the center of a touch key. If you touch off-center it may activate the nearby function instead.
4. Touch keys can only be used when the Touch Screen is unlocked. Press the Unlock Key () to turn on the Touch Screen.
5. Keep metal and other conductive material away from the surface of touch keys because contact may cause electronic interference.

WARNINGS

- Do not put heavy objects on the Touch Screen.
- Do not sit on your phone, which may damage the Touch Screen.
- Do not drag or scratch your phone with any sharp materials.
- Do not keep your phone in extreme conditions (places that are too humid, hot, or cold).
- Keep chemicals away from your phone, which may change the cosmetic or functional features of your phone.

How to Unlock



Touch the padlock image **OR** to unlock.



Press the Unlock Key on the top of your phone twice.


How to Scroll Using the Touch Screen

Touch the screen and drag (or flick) up and down to scroll the screen up or down.

Touch Screen Features and Access

It's quick and easy to access menus and features with the **versa** Touch Screen. With it, you have instant access to Messaging, Calling, Main Menu, Contact List, and Idle Screen Settings with the quick touch of your finger tip. And it only takes a few more quick finger touches to access anything else.

1. Touch  or press the Unlock Key () at the top edge of the device twice.
2. Touch a Touch Key.
 - Touch Soft Keys (at the bottom of the screen)
 - Shortcut Menu Touch Key (at the right side of the screen)
3. To return to the Idle Screen, press the Clear/Voice Commands Key () or Power/End Key ().



Main Menu Access

To access the Main Menu from standby mode, first unlock the Touch Screen (the Touch Screen is locked by default). Touch  or press the Unlock Key () on the top left edge of the phone twice. Then touch the MENU  Touch Soft Key to access the Main Menu.

Touch the MENU 
Touch Soft Key at the bottom of the screen to open the Main Menu.



The main menus are displayed as shown. Touch any of the menu icons with your fingertip to go to that menu.



Press the Clear/Voice Commands key to go back to standby mode.

Standby Mode Idle Screens

Customize your Touch Screen to have instant access to features you want to keep as close as a single finger touch.

The *versa* has three Standby Mode Idle Screens for quick, direct access to several frequently used device features.

Favorites: Displays favorite Contacts you choose to instantly view, call, message, or view contact history.

Shortcuts: Displays favorite device features such as My Music, Calendar, etc. for instant accessibility.

Media: Displays favorite photos, videos and music so you can show them off at a moment's notice without having to search.

Set the features and items you want on each Idle screen and even display different backgrounds for each one.



Changing Standby Mode Idle Screens

Standby mode idle screens are listed near the top of the Touch Screen. Accessing them is as easy as a swipe of a finger. With the Touch Screen unlocked, lightly flick your fingertip horizontally in either direction across the Touch Screen to instantly display the next Idle Screen.

Adding and Removing Idle Screen Touch Key Icons

Adding and removing Idle Screen icons is a snap. Simply touch the Shortcut Menu  Touch Key at the right side of the screen, then make your changes.

- **To Add:** Touch **ADD FAVORITES, More,** or **ADD MEDIA** to view items available to add. Touch the one(s) you want (checkmark appears), then touch **DONE**.
- **To Remove Favorites and Media icons:** Drag icon to trashcan icon, touch **Yes** to confirm, then touch **DONE**.
- **To Remove Shortcuts icons:** Display the full list of available items by touching the **ADD SHORTCUTS** button and scroll through the list. Touch the one(s) to remove (checkmark disappears), then touch **DONE**.

Vibrate Mode

Sets the phone to vibrate instead of ring ( is displayed). To set Vibrate Mode, press the Side Volume Keys  and adjust to Vibrate Only.

To return to Normal Mode, press the Side Volume Keys  and adjust volume again.

or

Using the dial pad, touch and hold  to activate/deactivate vibrate mode.

Mute Function

The Mute Function prevents the transmission of your voice to the caller. To quickly activate Mute touch  - this option will appear during active phone calls.

Volume Quick Adjustment

Quickly adjust ringer and earpiece volumes by pressing the upper side key to increase and lower key to decrease.

NOTE The earpiece volume can only be adjusted during a call and keypad volume can only be adjusted through the Menu.

To turn off sounds, press and hold the lower side volume key for 3 seconds then press and hold the upper side volume key for 3 seconds to return to normal sounds mode.


Call Waiting

During a call, a beep will sound indicating you have another incoming call.

Ignoring a Call Waiting



Storing Basics


Using RSS reader

RSS (Really Simple Syndication) is a family of web feed formats used to publish frequently updated content such as blog entries, news headlines or podcasts. An RSS document, which is called a feed, web feed, or channel, contains either a summary of content from an associated web site or the full text. RSS makes it possible for people to keep up with their favorite web sites in an automated manner that is easier than checking them manually.

To add an RSS feed, you must first be on a website that supports RSS. The RSS registration indicator will show the RSS icon if the site has RSS. Touch the RSS registration indicator to add the RSS Feed to your Feeds.

NOTE Opening your saved RSS Feeds is also available from your Bookmarks Menu.





11.4 Software Update

Automatic Update

Your phone will receive a notification that there is an updated version of software available to be downloaded. You can touch the Upgrade when notified that a download is available or it can happen automatically. Once the download is complete you may, depending on the nature of the

update, have three options available: Accept the update, Defer the update, or Reject the update.

NOTE During the update you cannot make or receive phone calls, including 911 calls, or text messages.

Manual Update

TIA Safety Information

The following is the complete TIA Safety Information for wireless handheld phones.

Exposure to Radio Frequency Signal

Your wireless handheld portable phone is a low power radio transmitter and receiver. When ON, it receives and sends out Radio Frequency (RF) signals.

In August, 1996, the Federal Communications Commissions (FCC) adopted RF exposure guidelines with safety levels for handheld wireless phones. Those guidelines are consistent with the safety standards previously set by both U.S. and international standards bodies:

ANSI C95.1 (1992) *

NCRP Report 86 (1986)

ICNIRP (1996)

* American National Standards Institute; National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurements; International Commission on Non-Ionizing Radiation Protection

Those standards were based on comprehensive and periodic evaluations of the relevant scientific literature. For example, over 120 scientists, engineers, and physicians from universities, government health agencies, and industry reviewed the available body of research to develop the ANSI Standard (C95.1).

The design of your phone complies with the FCC guidelines (and those standards).

Antenna Care

Use only the supplied or an approved replacement antenna. Unauthorized antennas, modifications, or attachments could damage the phone and may violate FCC regulations.

Phone Operation

NORMAL POSITION: Hold the phone as you would any other telephone with the antenna pointed up and over your shoulder.

Tips on Efficient Operation

For your phone to operate most efficiently:

Don't touch the antenna unnecessarily when the phone is in use. Contact with the antenna affects call quality and may cause the phone to operate at a higher power level than otherwise needed.

Driving

Check the laws and regulations on the use of wireless phones in the areas where you drive and always obey them. Also, if using your phone while driving, please observe the following:

- Give full attention to driving -- driving safely is your first responsibility;
- Use hands-free operation, if available;
- Pull off the road and park before making or answering a call if driving conditions or the law require it.

Electronic Devices

Most modern electronic equipment is shielded from RF signals. However, certain electronic equipment may not be shielded

against the RF signals from your wireless phone.

Pacemakers

The Health Industry Manufacturers Association recommends that a minimum separation of six (6) inches be maintained between a handheld wireless phone and a pacemaker to avoid potential interference with the pacemaker. These recommendations are consistent with the independent research by and recommendations of Wireless Technology Research.

Persons with pacemakers:

- Should ALWAYS keep the phone more than six (6) inches from their pacemaker when the phone is turned ON;
- Should not carry the phone in a breast pocket;
- Should use the ear opposite the pacemaker to minimize the potential for interference;
- Should turn the phone OFF immediately if there is any reason to suspect that interference is taking place.



Hearing Aids

Some digital wireless phones may interfere with some hearing aids. In the event of such interference, you may want to consult your service provider (or call the customer service line to discuss alternatives).

Other Medical Devices and Health Care Facilities

If you use any other personal medical device, consult the manufacturer of your device to determine if it is adequately shielded from the external RF energy. Your physician may be able to assist you in obtaining this information.

Turn your phone OFF in health care facilities when any regulations posted in these areas instruct you to do so. Hospitals or health care facilities may use equipment that could be sensitive to the external RF energy.

Vehicles

RF signals may affect improperly installed or inadequately shielded electronic systems in motor vehicles. Check with the manufacturer or its representative regarding your vehicle. You should

also consult the manufacturer of any equipment that has been added to your vehicle.

Aircraft

FCC regulations prohibit using your phone while in the air. Switch OFF your phone before boarding an aircraft.

Blasting Areas

To avoid interfering with blasting operations, turn your phone OFF when in a “blasting area” or in areas posted: “Turn off two-way radio”. Obey all signs and instructions.

Potentially Explosive Atmosphere

Turn your phone OFF when in any area with a potentially explosive atmosphere and obey all signs and instructions. Sparks in such areas could cause an explosion or fire resulting in bodily injury or even death.

Areas with a potentially explosive atmosphere are often, but not always marked clearly. Potential areas may include: fueling areas (such as gasoline stations); below deck on boats; fuel or chemical transfer or storage facilities;

vehicles using liquefied petroleum gas (such as propane or butane); areas where the air contains chemicals or particles (such as grain, dust, or metal powders); and any other area where you would normally be advised to turn off your vehicle engine.

For Vehicles Equipped with an Air Bag

An air bag inflates with great force. DO NOT place objects, including either installed or portable wireless equipment, in the area over the air bag or in the air bag deployment area. If in-vehicle wireless equipment is improperly installed and the air bag inflates, serious injury could result.

Safety Information

Please read and observe the following information for safe and proper use of your phone and to prevent damage. Also, keep the user guide in an accessible place at all times after reading it.

 **Caution** Violation of the instructions may cause minor or serious damage to the product.

- Do not disassemble or open, crush, bend or deform, puncture or shred.
- Do not modify or remanufacture, attempt to insert foreign objects into the battery, immerse or expose to water or other liquids, expose to fire, explosion or other hazard.
- Only use the battery for the system for which it is specified.
- Only use the battery with a charging system that has been qualified with the system per IEEE-Std-1725-2006. Use of an unqualified battery or charger may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage, or other hazard.
- Do not short circuit a battery or allow metallic conductive objects to contact battery terminals.
- Replace the battery only with another battery that has been qualified with the system per this standard, IEEE-Std-1725-2006. Use of an unqualified battery may present a risk of fire, explosion, leakage or other hazard.



- Promptly dispose of used batteries in accordance with local regulations.

- Using the phone in proximity to receiving equipment (i.e., TV or radio) may cause interference to the phone.
- Do not use the phone if the antenna is damaged. If a damaged antenna contacts skin, it may cause a slight burn. Please contact an LG Authorized Service Center to replace the damaged antenna.
- Do not immerse your phone in water. If this happens, turn it off



immediately and remove the battery. If the phone does not work, take it to an LG Authorized Service Center.

- Do not paint your phone.
- The data saved in your phone might be deleted due to careless use, repair of the phone, or upgrade of the software. Please backup your important phone numbers. (Ringtones, text messages, voice messages, pictures, and videos could also be deleted.) The manufacturer is not liable for damage due to the loss of data.
- When you use the phone in public places, set the ringtone to vibration so you don't disturb others.
- Do not turn your phone on or off when putting it to your ear.
- Use accessories, such as earphones and headsets, with caution. Ensure that cables are tucked away safely and do not touch the antenna unnecessarily.

Caution: ***Avoid potential hearing loss.***

Prolonged exposure to loud sounds (including music) is the most common cause of preventable hearing loss. Some scientific research suggests that using portable audio devices, such as portable music players and cellular telephones, at high volume settings for long durations may lead to permanent noise induced hearing loss. This includes the use of headphones (including headsets, earbuds and Bluetooth® or other wireless devices). Exposure to very loud sound has also been associated in some studies with tinnitus (a ringing in the ear), hypersensitivity to sound and distorted hearing. Individual susceptibility to noise-induced hearing loss and other potential hearing problems varies.

The amount of sound produced by a portable audio device varies depending on the nature of the sound, the device, the device settings and the headphones. You should follow some commonsense recommendations when using any portable audio device:

- Set the volume in a quiet environment and select the lowest volume at which you can hear adequately.
- When using headphones, turn the volume down if you cannot hear the people speaking near you or if the person sitting next to you can hear what you are listening to.
- Do not turn the volume up to block out noisy surroundings. If you choose to listen to your portable device in a noisy environment, use noise-cancelling headphones to block out background environmental noise.
- Limit the amount of time you listen. As the volume increases, less time is required before your hearing could be affected.
- Avoid using headphones after exposure to extremely loud noises, such as rock concerts, that might cause temporary hearing loss. Temporary hearing loss might cause unsafe volumes to sound normal.
- Do not listen at any volume that causes you discomfort. If you experience ringing in your ears,

hear muffled speech or experience any temporary hearing difficulty after listening to your portable audio device, discontinue use and consult your doctor.

FDA Consumer Update



The U.S. Food and Drug Administration's Center for Devices and

Radiological Health Consumer Update on Mobile Phones:

1. Do wireless phones pose a health hazard?

The available scientific evidence does not show that any health problems are associated with using wireless phones. There is no proof, however, that wireless phones are absolutely safe. Wireless phones emit low levels of Radio Frequency (RF) energy in the microwave range while being used. They also emit very low levels of RF when in standby mode. Whereas high levels of RF can produce health effects (by heating tissue), exposure to low level RF that does not produce heating effects causes no known adverse health effects. Many studies of low level RF exposures have not found any biological effects. Some studies have suggested that some biological effects may occur, but such findings have not been confirmed by additional research. In some

cases, other researchers have had difficulty in reproducing those studies, or in determining the reasons for inconsistent results.

2. What is the FDA's role concerning the safety of wireless phones?

Under the law, the FDA does not review the safety of radiation-emitting consumer products such as wireless phones before they can be sold, as it does with new drugs or medical devices. However, the agency has authority to take action if wireless phones are shown to emit Radio Frequency (RF) energy at a level that is hazardous to the user. In such a case, the FDA could require the manufacturers of wireless phones to notify users of the health hazard and to repair, replace, or recall the phones so that the hazard no longer exists. Although the existing scientific data does not justify FDA regulatory actions, the FDA has urged the wireless phone industry to take a number of steps, including the following:

- Support needed research into possible biological effects of RF of the type emitted by wireless phones;

- Design wireless phones in a way that minimizes any RF exposure to the user that is not necessary for device function; and
- Cooperate in providing users of wireless phones with the best possible information on possible effects of wireless phone use on human health.

The FDA belongs to an interagency working group of the federal agencies that have responsibility for different aspects of RF safety to ensure coordinated efforts at the federal level. The following agencies belong to this working group:

- National Institute for Occupational Safety and Health
- Environmental Protection Agency
- Occupational Safety and Health Administration
- National Telecommunications and Information Administration

The National Institutes of Health participates in some interagency working group activities, as well. The FDA shares regulatory responsibilities for wireless phones with the Federal Communications Commission (FCC). All phones that



are sold in the United States must comply with FCC safety guidelines that limit RF exposure. The FCC relies on the FDA and other health agencies for safety questions about wireless phones.

The FCC also regulates the base stations that the wireless phone networks rely upon. While these base stations operate at higher power than do the wireless phones themselves, the RF exposures that people get from these base stations are typically thousands of times lower than those they can get from wireless phones. Base stations are thus not the subject of the safety questions discussed in this document.

3. What kinds of phones are the subject of this update?

The term “wireless phone” refers here to handheld wireless phones with built-in antennas, often called “cell”, “mobile”, or “PCS” phones. These types of wireless phones can expose the user to measurable Radio Frequency (RF) energy because of the short distance between the phone and the user’s head.

These RF exposures are limited by FCC safety guidelines that were

developed with the advice of the FDA and other federal health and safety agencies. When the phone is located at greater distances from the user, the exposure to RF is drastically lower because a person’s RF exposure decreases rapidly with increasing distance from the source. The so-called “cordless phones,” which have a base unit connected to the telephone wiring in a house, typically operate at far lower power levels, and thus produce RF exposures far below the FCC safety limits.

4. What are the results of the research done already?

The research done thus far has produced conflicting results, and many studies have suffered from flaws in their research methods. Animal experiments investigating the effects of Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures characteristic of wireless phones have yielded conflicting results that often cannot be repeated in other laboratories. A few animal studies, however, have suggested that low levels of RF could accelerate the development of cancer in laboratory animals. However, many of the studies that

showed increased tumor development used animals that had been genetically engineered or treated with cancer-causing chemicals so as to be pre-disposed to develop cancer in the absence of RF exposure. Other studies exposed the animals to RF for up to 22 hours per day. These conditions are not similar to the conditions under which people use wireless phones, so we do not know with certainty what the results of such studies mean for human health. Three large epidemiology studies have been published since December 2000. Between them, the studies investigated any possible association between the use of wireless phones and primary brain cancer, glioma, meningioma, or acoustic neuroma, tumors of the brain or salivary gland, leukemia, or other cancers. None of the studies demonstrated the existence of any harmful health effects from wireless phone RF exposures. However, none of the studies can answer questions about long-term exposures, since the average period of phone use in these studies was around three years.

5. What research is needed to decide whether RF exposure from wireless phones poses a health risk?

A combination of laboratory studies and epidemiological studies of people actually using wireless phones would provide some of the data that are needed. Lifetime animal exposure studies could be completed in a few years. However, very large numbers of animals would be needed to provide reliable proof of a cancer promoting effect, if one exists. Epidemiological studies can provide data that is directly applicable to human populations, but ten or more years follow-up may be needed to provide answers about some health effects, such as cancer. This is because the interval between the time of exposure to a cancer-causing agent and the time tumors develop — if they do — may be many, many years. The interpretation of epidemiological studies is hampered by difficulties in measuring actual RF exposure during day-to-day use of wireless phones. Many factors affect this measurement, such as the angle at which the phone is held, or which model of phone is used.



6. What is the FDA doing to find out more about the possible health effects of wireless phone RF?

The FDA is working with the U.S. National Toxicology Program and with groups of investigators around the world to ensure that high priority animal studies are conducted to address important questions about the effects of exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy.

The FDA has been a leading participant in the World Health Organization International Electro Magnetic Fields (EMF) Project since its inception in 1996. An influential result of this work has been the development of a detailed agenda of research needs that has driven the establishment of new research programs around the world. The project has also helped develop a series of public information documents on EMF issues.

The FDA and the Cellular Telecommunications & Internet Association (CTIA) have a formal Cooperative Research And Development Agreement (CRADA) to do research on wireless phone safety. The FDA provides the scientific oversight, obtaining input

from experts in government, industry, and academic organizations. CTIA-funded research is conducted through contracts with independent investigators. The initial research will include both laboratory studies and studies of wireless phone users. The CRADA will also include a broad assessment of additional research needs in the context of the latest research developments around the world.

7. How can I find out how much Radio Frequency energy exposure I can get by using my wireless phone?

All phones sold in the United States must comply with Federal Communications Commission (FCC) guidelines that limit Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposures. The FCC established these guidelines in consultation with the FDA and the other federal health and safety agencies. The FCC limit for RF exposure from wireless phones is set at a Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC limit is consistent with the safety standards developed by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic

Engineering (IEEE) and the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement. The exposure limit takes into consideration the body's ability to remove heat from the tissues that absorb energy from the wireless phone and is set well below levels known to have effects. Manufacturers of wireless phones must report the RF exposure level for each model of phone to the FCC. The FCC website (<http://www.fcc.gov/oet/rfsafety>) gives directions for locating the FCC identification number on your phone so you can find your phone's RF exposure level in the online listing.

8. What has the FDA done to measure the Radio Frequency energy coming from wireless phones?

The Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE) is developing a technical standard for measuring the Radio Frequency (RF) energy exposure from wireless phones and other wireless handsets with the participation and leadership of FDA scientists and engineers. The standard, "Recommended Practice for Determining the Spatial-Peak

Specific Absorption Rate (SAR) in the Human Body Due to Wireless Communications Devices: Experimental Techniques", sets forth the first consistent test methodology for measuring the rate at which RF is deposited in the heads of wireless phone users. The test method uses a tissue-simulating model of the human head. Standardized SAR test methodology is expected to greatly improve the consistency of measurements made at different laboratories on the same phone. SAR is the measurement of the amount of energy absorbed in tissue, either by the whole body or a small part of the body. It is measured in watts/kg (or milliwatts/g) of matter. This measurement is used to determine whether a wireless phone complies with safety guidelines.

9. What steps can I take to reduce my exposure to Radio Frequency energy from my wireless phone?

If there is a risk from these products — and at this point we do not know that there is — it is probably very small. But if you are concerned about avoiding even potential risks, you can take a few



simple steps to minimize your exposure to Radio Frequency (RF) energy. Since time is a key factor in how much exposure a person receives, reducing the amount of time spent using a wireless phone will reduce RF exposure. If you must conduct extended conversations by wireless phone every day, you could place more distance between your body and the source of the RF, since the exposure level drops off dramatically with distance. For example, you could use a headset and carry the wireless phone away from your body or use a wireless phone connected to a remote antenna. Again, the scientific data does not demonstrate that wireless phones are harmful. But if you are concerned about the RF exposure from these products, you can use measures like those described above to reduce your RF exposure from wireless phone use.

10. What about children using wireless phones?

The scientific evidence does not show a danger to users of wireless phones, including children and teenagers. If you want to take steps to lower exposure to Radio

Frequency (RF) energy, the measures described above would apply to children and teenagers using wireless phones. Reducing the time of wireless phone use and increasing the distance between the user and the RF source will reduce RF exposure.

Some groups sponsored by other national governments have advised that children be discouraged from using wireless phones at all. For example, the government in the United Kingdom distributed leaflets containing such a recommendation in December 2000. They noted that no evidence exists that using a wireless phone causes brain tumors or other ill effects. Their recommendation to limit wireless phone use by children was strictly precautionary; it was not based on scientific evidence that any health hazard exists.

11. What about wireless phone interference with medical equipment?

Radio Frequency (RF) energy from wireless phones can interact with some electronic devices. For this reason, the FDA helped develop a detailed test method to measure Electro Magnetic Interference

(EMI) of implanted cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators from wireless telephones. This test method is now part of a standard sponsored by the Association for the Advancement of Medical Instrumentation (AAMI). The final draft, a joint effort by the FDA, medical device manufacturers, and many other groups, was completed in late 2000. This standard will allow manufacturers to ensure that cardiac pacemakers and defibrillators are safe from wireless phone EMI.

The FDA has tested hearing aids for interference from handheld wireless phones and helped develop a voluntary standard sponsored by the Institute of Electrical and Electronic Engineers (IEEE). This standard specifies test methods and performance requirements for hearing aids and wireless phones so that no interference occurs when a person uses a “compatible” phone and a “compatible” hearing aid at the same time. This standard was approved by the IEEE in 2000.

The FDA continues to monitor the use of wireless phones for possible interactions with other medical devices. Should harmful

interference be found to occur, the FDA will conduct testing to assess the interference and work to resolve the problem.

10 Driver Safety Tips

Your wireless phone gives you the powerful ability to communicate by voice almost anywhere, anytime.

An important responsibility accompanies the benefits of wireless phones, one that every user must uphold.

When operating a car, driving is your first responsibility. When using your wireless phone behind the wheel of a car, practice good common sense and remember the following tips:

1. Get to know your wireless phone and its features such as speed dial and redial. Carefully read your instruction manual and learn to take advantage of valuable features most phones offer, including automatic redial and memory. Also, work to memorize the phone keypad so you can use the speed dial function without taking your attention off the road.
 2. When available, use a hands-free device. A number of hands-free wireless phone accessories are readily available today. Whether you choose an installed
- mounted device for your wireless phone or a speaker phone accessory, take advantage of these devices if available to you.
3. Make sure you place your wireless phone within easy reach and where you can reach it without removing your eyes from the road. If you get an incoming call at an inconvenient time, if possible, let your Voicemail answer it for you.
 4. Suspend conversations during hazardous driving conditions or situations. Let the person you are speaking with know you are driving; if necessary, suspend the call in heavy traffic or hazardous weather conditions. Rain, sleet, snow, and ice can be hazardous, but so is heavy traffic. As a driver, your first responsibility is to pay attention to the road.
 5. Don't take notes or look up phone numbers while driving. If you are reading an address book or business card, or writing a "to-do" list while driving a car, you are not watching where you

- are going. It is common sense. Do not get caught in a dangerous situation because you are reading or writing and not paying attention to the road or nearby vehicles.
6. Dial sensibly and assess the traffic; if possible, place calls when you are not moving or before pulling into traffic. Try to plan your calls before you begin your trip or attempt to coincide your calls with times you may be stopped at a stop sign, red light, or otherwise stationary. But if you need to dial while driving, follow this simple tip -- dial only a few numbers, check the road and your mirrors, then continue.
 7. Do not engage in stressful or emotional conversations that may be distracting. Stressful or emotional conversations and driving do not mix; they are distracting and even dangerous when you are behind the wheel of a car. Make people you are talking with aware you are driving and if necessary, suspend conversations which have the potential to divert your attention from the road.
 8. Use your wireless phone to call for help. Your wireless phone is one of the greatest tools you can own to protect yourself and your family in dangerous situations -- with your phone at your side, help is only three numbers away. Dial 911 or other local emergency number in the case of fire, traffic accident, road hazard, or medical emergency. Remember, it's a free call on your wireless phone!
 9. Use your wireless phone to help others in emergencies. Your wireless phone provides you a perfect opportunity to be a "Good Samaritan" in your community. If you see an auto accident, crime in progress or other serious emergency where lives are in danger, call 911 or other local emergency number, as you would want others to do for you.
 10. Call roadside assistance or a special wireless non-emergency assistance number when necessary. Certain situations you encounter while driving may require attention, but are not



urgent enough to merit a call for emergency services. But you can still use your wireless phone to lend a hand. If you see a broken-down vehicle posing no serious hazard, a broken traffic signal, a minor traffic accident where no one appears injured or a vehicle you know to be stolen, call roadside assistance or other special non-emergency wireless number.

The above tips are meant as general guidelines. Before deciding to use your mobile device while operating a vehicle, it is recommended that you consult your applicable jurisdiction's local laws or other regulations regarding such use. Such laws or other regulations may prohibit or otherwise restrict the manner in which a driver may use his or her phone while operating a vehicle.

Consumer Information on SAR

(Specific Absorption Rate)

This Model Phone Meets the Government's Requirements for Exposure to Radio Waves. Your wireless phone is a radio transmitter and receiver. It is designed and manufactured not to exceed the emission limits for exposure to radiofrequency (RF) energy set by the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) of the U.S. Government. These FCC exposure limits are derived from the recommendations of two expert organizations, the National Council on Radiation Protection and Measurement (NCRP) and the Institute of Electrical and Electronics Engineers (IEEE). In both cases, the recommendations were developed by scientific and engineering experts drawn from industry, government, and academia after extensive reviews of the scientific literature related to the biological effects of RF energy. The exposure Limit for wireless mobile phones employs a unit of measurement known as the Specific Absorption Rate, or SAR. The SAR is a measure of the rate of

absorption of RF energy by the human body expressed in units of watts per kilogram (W/kg). The FCC requires wireless phones to comply with a safety limit of 1.6 watts per kilogram (1.6 W/kg). The FCC exposure limit incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection to the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

Tests for SAR are conducted using standard operating positions specified by the FCC with the phone transmitting at its highest certified power level in all tested frequency bands. Although SAR is determined at the highest certified power level, the actual SAR level of the phone while operating can be well below the maximum value. Because the phone is designed to operate at multiple power levels to use only the power required to reach the network, in general, the closer you are to a wireless base station antenna, the lower the power output.

Before a phone model is available for sale to the public, it must be tested and certified to the FCC that it does not exceed the limit established by the government-adopted requirement for safe

exposure. The tests are performed in positions and locations (e.g., at the ear and worn on the body) as required by the FCC for each model. This device was tested for typical body-worn operations with the back of the phone kept 0.79 inches (2.0 cm) between the user's body and the back of the phone. To comply with FCC RF exposure requirements, a minimum separation distance of 0.79 inches (2.0 cm) must be maintained between the user's body and the back of the phone. Third-party belt-clips, holsters, and similar accessories containing metallic components should not be used. Body-worn accessories that cannot maintain 0.79 inches (2.0 cm) separation distance between the user's body and the back of the phone, and have not been tested for typical body-worn operations may not comply with FCC RF exposure limits and should be avoided.

The FCC has granted an Equipment Authorization for this model phone with all reported SAR levels evaluated as in compliance with the FCC RF emission guidelines. The highest SAR value for this model phone when tested for use at



the ear is 1.38 W/kg and when worn on the body, as described in this user's manual, is 0.764 W/kg. While there may be differences between SAR levels of various phones and at various positions, they all meet the government requirement for safe exposure.

SAR information on this model phone is on file with the FCC and can be found under the Display Grant section of

<http://www.fcc.gov/oet/fccid> after searching on FCC ID.

To find information that pertains to a particular model phone, this site uses the phone FCC ID number which is usually printed somewhere on the case of the phone.

Sometimes it may be necessary to remove the battery pack to find the number. Once you have the FCC ID number for a particular phone, follow the instructions on the website and it should provide values for typical or maximum SAR for a particular phone.

*In the United States and Canada, the SAR limit for mobile phones used by the public is 1.6 watts/kg (W/kg) averaged over one gram of tissue. The standard incorporates a substantial margin of safety to give additional protection for the public and to account for any variations in measurements.

FCC Hearing-Aid Compatibility (HAC) Regulations for Wireless Devices

On July 10, 2003, the U.S. Federal Communications Commission (FCC) Report and Order in WT Docket 01-309 modified the exception of wireless phones under the Hearing Aid Compatibility Act of 1988 (HAC Act) to require digital wireless phones be compatible with hearing-aids. The intent of the HAC Act is to ensure reasonable access to telecommunications services for persons with hearing disabilities. While some wireless phones are used near some hearing devices (hearing aids and cochlear implants), users may detect a buzzing, humming, or whining noise. Some hearing devices are more

immune than others to this interference noise, and phones also vary in the amount of interference they generate.



The wireless telephone industry has developed a rating system for wireless phones, to assist hearing device users to find phones that may be compatible with their hearing devices. Not all phones have been rated. Phones that are rated have the rating on their box or a label located on the box.

The ratings are not guarantees. Results will vary depending on the user's hearing device and hearing loss. If your hearing device happens to be vulnerable to interference, you may not be able to use a rated phone successfully.

Trying out the phone with your hearing device is the best way to evaluate it for your personal needs. M-Ratings: Phones rated M3 or M4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. M4 is the better/higher of the two ratings.

T-Ratings: Phones rated T3 or T4 meet FCC requirements and are likely to generate less interference to hearing devices than phones that are not labeled. T4 is the

better/higher of the two ratings. Hearing devices may also be rated. Your hearing device manufacturer or hearing health professional may help you find this rating. Higher ratings mean that the hearing device is relatively immune to interference noise. The hearing aid and wireless phone rating values are then added together. A sum of 5 is considered acceptable for normal use. A sum of 6 is considered for best use.



In the above example, if a hearing aid meets the M2 level rating and the wireless phone meets the M3 level rating, the sum of the two values equal M5. This should



provide the hearing aid user with “normal usage” while using their hearing aid with the particular wireless phone. “Normal usage” in this context is defined as a signal quality that’s acceptable for normal operation.

The M mark is intended to be synonymous with the U mark. The T mark is intended to be synonymous with the UT mark. The M and T marks are recommended by the Alliance for Telecommunications Industries Solutions (ATIS). The U and UT marks are referenced in Section 20.19 of the FCC Rules. The HAC rating and measurement procedure are described in the American National Standards Institute (ANSI) C63.19 standard. To enter that the Hearing Aid Compatibility rating for your phone is maintained, secondary transmitters such as Bluetooth and WLAN (this phone does not have WLAN) components must be disabled during a call. See Page 91 for instructions to disable these components.

Evolution **D**ata **O**nly or Evolution Data Optimized (abbreviated as EVDO, EV-DO, EvDO, 1xEV-DO or 1xEvDO) provides fast wireless broadband access (3G) anywhere, without needing a WiFi hotspot.

GPS

Global **P**ositioning **S**ystem is a system of satellites, computers, and receivers able to determine the latitude and longitude of a specific receiver on Earth. Position is calculated using time and distance.

IS 2000

Type of digital signaling. It's the second generation of CDMA digital cellular, an extension of IS-95. Differences between signaling types have to do with pilot signal and links to provide more traffic channels, and control protocols.

NAM

Number **A**ssignment **M**odule is how the phone stores the phone number and its electronic serial number.

SSL

Secure **S**ockets **L**ayer Protocol used to encrypt data sent over the air.

TTY

Tele**t**ypewriter. An electromechanical typewriter that either transmits or receives messages coded in electrical signals. A phone with TTY support is able to translate typed characters to voice or translate voice into characters to display on the TTY.

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
